## Dates in History

- 1776 On January 2nd, the Continental Congress published the "Tory Act" resolution which described how colonies should handle those Americans who remained loyal to the British and King George. The act called on colonial committees to indoctrinate those "honest and well-meaning, but uninformed people" by enlightening them to the "origin, nature and extent of the present controversy."
- 1803 On January 18th, President Thomas Jefferson sent a special confidential message to Congress asking for money to fund the journey of Lewis and Clark. In the summer of 1802, Jefferson began actively preparing for the mission recruiting his secretary, Meriwether Lewis, to be its leader. Throughout 1802 Jefferson and Lewis discussed the proposed mission, telling no-one, not even Congress, which would have to approve the funds what they were contemplating
- 1908 On January 24th, the Boy Scouts Movement began in England with the first installment of Robert Baden-Powell's Scouting for Boys.
- 1946 On January 10th, the first General Assembly of the United Nations, comprising of 51 nations, convened at Westminster Central Hall in London, England. One week later, the U.N. Security Council met for the first time and established its rules of procedure. Then on January 24th, the General Assembly adopted its first resolution, a measure calling for the peaceful uses of atomic energy and the elimination of atomic and other weapons of mass destruction.
